

WHAT WE DO

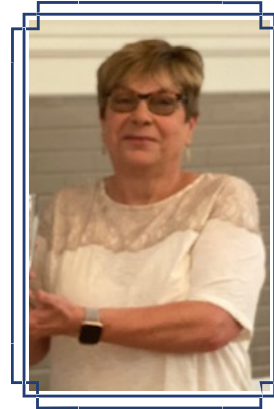

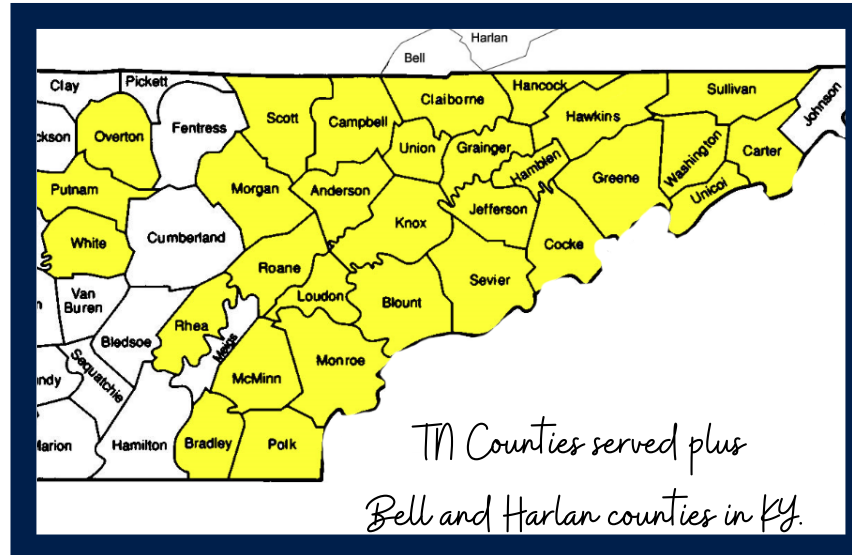

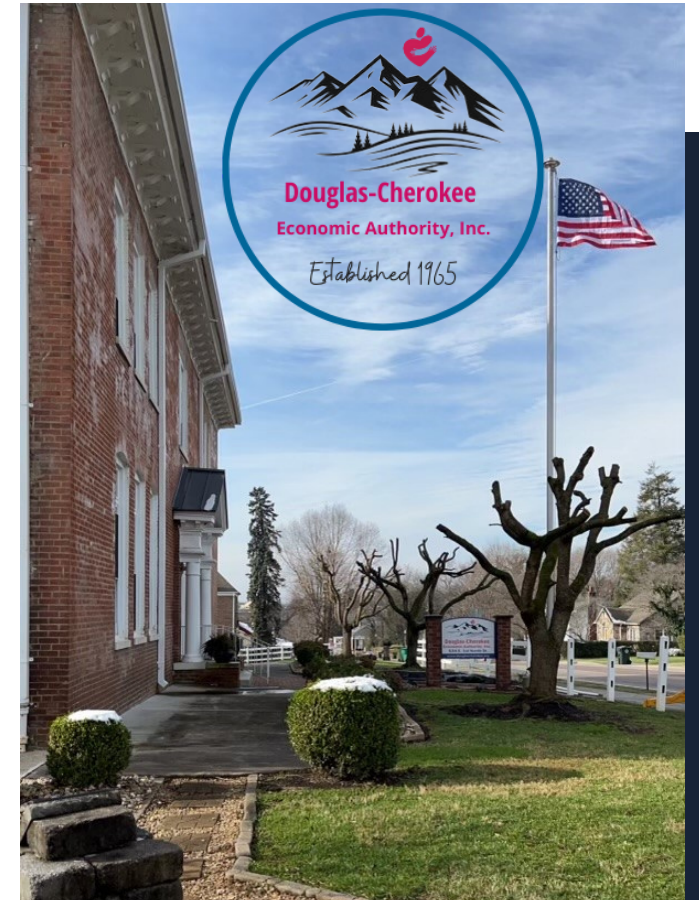

Affordable Housing

The Affordable Housing Program manages 1,377 units of affordable rental housing for low-income seniors and families. Rents are structured so that tenants pay no more than 30% of their monthly income for housing costs at most locations.

AFTERSCHOOL PROGRAMS

The Afterschool programs serve schools with high rates of poverty and/or low achieving schools as determined by the TN Department of Education.

Afterschool programs funded through 21st Century Community Learning Centers grants are located at 10 sites in Grainger, Hamblen, and Union counties. The centers provide afterschool tutoring, counseling, physical fitness, and academic enrichment activities for underachieving students enrolled in the targeted schools.

Afterschool programs funded through the Lottery for Education program provide tutoring, counseling, academic enrichment, and physical fitness activities for underachievers in 6 sites in Grainger, Hamblen, and Union counties. All afterschool programs in Hamblen County provide individualized English Language Learner instruction.

TEEN OUTREACH PROGRAM (SRAE)

The Teen Outreach Program helps low-income youth in grades 6-9 to develop self-regulation, goal-setting, and other social/emotional/cognitive skills necessary to avoid early parenthood, illicit drug and alcohol use, and other risky behaviors. Services include the delivery of the evidence-based Teen Outreach Program curriculum in school and/or after school settings, parent and community engagement, and community service learning. Target middle and alternative schools are located in Hamblen and Hancock counties.

Head Start/Early Head Start

Head Start/Early Head Start targets children and families meeting federal poverty guidelines. Head Start/Early Head Start assists families and children to become socially competent and gain developmentally appropriate skills required for successful entry into public school and academic and social success. Early Head Start provides quality care and an early foundation for learning for children from birth to three years of age and for pregnant women. Head Start provides comprehensive early childhood education for three to four year old children. Children with disabilities are fully included into the regular classroom, with services provided by the local school system. All program services focus on parent, family, and community engagement.

Community Services Programs

SENIOR NUTRITION PROGRAM

The Senior Nutrition Program provides home-delivered meals to homebound seniors. The meals provide one-third of the recommended daily allowance of nutrients for older adults. Eligibility is based on the need for the service, but the majority of clients meet federal poverty guidelines. Delivery personnel provide check-in services and distribute nutrition education information.

Counties served are Cocke, Grainger, Hamblen, Jefferson, Monroe, and Sevier.

NEIGHBORHOOD SERVICE CENTERS

The Neighborhood Service Centers, located in Cocke, Grainger, Hamblen, Jefferson, Monroe, and Sevier counties, provide emergency services on a limited basis. Services include vouchers for help with rent or mortgage payments, evictions, and utility disconnects; health and housing services, nutrition services; and distribution of food through the USDA Commodities Program. The centers also provide case management/bundled services known as Partners for Success. Eligibility for Community Services Block Grant-funded services is limited to those with incomes at or below 125% of the federal poverty level.

LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (LIHEAP)

LIHEAP provides assistance to income eligible households with higher energy costs. Clients may apply once during our fiscal year, between October and September, to receive a one-time payment to their energy bill. Applications are taken year-round for a payment that will come later. Crisis, or emergency aid, is on a first-come, first-served basis, available for households with poverty level income, a disconnect notice, or less than 30-day supply of fuel/wood. 70% of funds are spent on the regular LIHEAP program and 30% are reserved for clients in crisis. The program serves clients in Cocke, Grainger, Hamblen, Jefferson, Monroe, and Sevier counties.

LOW-INCOME HOME WATER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (LIHWAP)

LIHWAP provides eligible low-income households with assistance to reinstate or prevent disconnection of their water and/or wastewater services. Applicants that are eligible for LIHEAP assistance are categorically eligible for LIHWAP. This program serves clients in Cocke, Grainger, Hamblen, Jefferson, Monroe, and Sevier counties.

EMERGENCY RENTAL ASSISTANCE-EVICTION PREVENTION PROGRAM (ERA-EPP)

ERA-EPP, created through THDA helps eligible clients with rental assistance to prevent eviction. The program serves clients in Cocke, Grainger, Hamblen, Jefferson, Monroe, and Sevier counties.

Trio Programs

TALENT SEARCH

Talent Search assists low-income, potential first-generation college students (neither parent has a 4-year degree) enrolled in middle and high schools in Tennessee (Campbell, Claiborne, Scott) and Kentucky (Harlan, Bell) to prepare for postsecondary education. Services include tutoring, career and postsecondary exploration, assistance with admissions, and financial aid counseling.

UPWARD BOUND

Two Upward Bound programs assist low-income, potential first-generation college students (neither parent has a 4-year degree) enrolled in high schools in Grainger, Hawkins, Morgan, and Scott counties to prepare for postsecondary education. Services include Saturday classes during the school year and a six-week summer residential program at Carson-Newman University, tutoring, career and postsecondary exploration, assistance with admissions, and financial aid counseling. UB's focus is on academics including math, English, science, and a foreign language.

EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY CENTERS (EOC)

EOC assists low-income, potential first-generation (neither parent has a 4-year college degree) to complete a high school diploma or earn a GED/HiSet; explore careers requiring postsecondary education; apply for admissions; complete financial aid applications; and enroll in postsecondary education or training. EOC serves adults aged 19 and older in Claiborne, Cocke, Grainger, Hamblen, Hancock, Jefferson, and Hawkins counties.
